\$15,645, Savings \$7,132, PayPal \$2,210.43, and the CD is currently at \$20,227.56.

Chris noted that the recently completed "Souper Bowl" Auction was a success thanks to all the hard work of all the volunteers. It was one of the better auctions we had in several years and the wide selection of trains resulted in a very active crowd of bidders.

Chris mentioned that this was election year for the Division. There will be several vacancies on the Board that will need to be filled. He also mentioned the Board will revisit our Bylaws and discuss the possibility of changing the Bylaws so that our election cycle and terms of office correspond with the calendar year rather than the TCA fiscal year.

Next, Chris gave a report about the Division module trailer making its return to a school "Transportation Day" event, this time in Tempe. While a good time was enjoyed by all, Chris mentioned that he needed to choose his rolling stock a little better as the gondola filled with "Dinosaur" eggs was a little too tempting for the preschoolers to avoid picking the eggs and causing more than a few delayed shipments around the layout. On the plus side several parents became quite proficient at rerailing cars.

The Multi-Club picnic will be held this year! The date is set for Saturday April 2 at McCormick Stillman Railroad Park. The Paradise & Pacific Club secured the Stillman Ramada last year and both the Grand Canyon Model Railroaders and Desert Division will provide the Hamburgers, Hot Dogs, Ice Cream and Soda. As usual, club members are asked to bring a side dish, salad, or something else to share keeping with the picnic theme.

April 9 is a dual event day for us. It will be our regular April Meet Day and we have been asked to provide the trailer for the church's Children's Easter Party which will be held in the gym where we hold the auctions. The past several years we have assisted the Paradise & Pacific Club by providing the layout and they provide the manpower to run it. We will slowly transition from this arrangement to making it a Division project to

support our hosts and their youth programs in keeping with our non-profit charter.

May 14 will bring the return of the Pizza Meet. Following a very disappointing supply of pies last year we will check with another nearby pizza house. Instead of ordering a bunch of generic one and two item smaller pies, we will opt to order larger, more quality pies for the event. We also will have a few chosen items from the November auction moved into the Pizza Auction including several Railroadania items. Of course there is room for your own spring cleaning as well. His Dad would save the brochures and share them at work after the family returned home. These were of interest because they were from the early TCA Toy Train Museum, the Red Caboose and the Strasburg Railroad.

TCA Rio Grande Chapter News

It is February in New Mexico, and we alternate between cold and warm days. If your layout is in the garage as is mine, it is hard to work on the layout on those cold days. It is a good time to come out for a Chapter meeting. The goal of our Chapter is to increase our membership and to provide variety in our meetings.

The news on the "mask front" is that the Governor has updated the mandate on masks. Mask requirements have been removed from restaurants and the same goes for meetings. The church where we meet also dropped the requirement; however, members are welcome to wear masks if they feel it necessary.

Our meeting started at 9:00 AM with a swap meet for members. The main sale was the remainder of the "Meade Collection" which took up several tables. Several members purchased items before the collection was packed and sent to the Division for sale. The proceeds will go to our Chapter and the Desert Division. As we have done before, members are free to bring items to sell or swap prior to every meet.

Run, Show and Tell began with demonstrations by Chris Allen and Art Lites. As promised, we are providing the capability to run both O and S gauge trains. The objective is to add animation to our show. Since there is no train store within 400 miles, this also gives us the opportunity to see new technology and products in action.

In this vein, Chris Allen demonstrated the MTH low- cost Wi-Fi DCS Explorer. This allows you to run MTH Proto2 and Proto3 trains via smart phone or tablet. First, download the MTH App (it's free) on any Apple iOS or Android phone or Pad. The setup is very simple. You connect the Explorer device between you power source and your track. The power source does not need to be variable. You vary speed via your smart device. You can operate all the other usual train functions such as couplers, bell and horn. Additionally, you can limit

the top speed. The DCS app can support up to three trains. You don't have a have a smart phone, in fact some use low price tablets and pads just to have a larger screen.

I demonstrated Lionel's Bluetooth system. Again, you do not need a variable voltage transformer to operate these locomotives. You download the app on phone or tablet which again is free. I demonstrated three modes of operation, remote controller, included with locomotive, via smart device and smart device/voice. It is simple to operate. Provide a power source to track. You can then operate via the modes mentioned above. I also demonstrated operation by voice.

We had several other items shown. Scott Eckstein passed around some 1954 Railroad Magazines and spoke about acquiring the Meade Collection. Jim Trever brought a mint Pyro Spaceship set from the mid 1950's. This set is extremely rare, and Jim was able to purchase it from another Pyro collector. Greg Palmer provided in depth information about Lionel CW-80 transformers and gave further information about the history of the Meade Collection and his connection to the Meade Collection dating back to his childhood at age 12. Boyd Reasor brought a modern era American Flyer GP9 S gauge and demonstrated running it on George Domeny's "S" gauge test track. George brought several Post War Flyer engines and demonstrated operation as well. Peter Gerity brought a Gun Metal Gray 763E and explained how he bought this engine as a young man for \$13.50. Peter's humorous presentations are always enjoyed by the audience. Everett Hagan presented several of his 1/50th scale trucks with nice details including opening hoods and detailed engines. This month's Run Show and Tell was very interesting and enjoyed by all.

We had several ongoing items that were resolved. We did not think that we were prepared

to support a full-blown Pumpkin meet this year. Our cancellation fee to opt out of the Sheraton contract is \$600. However, I was able to move our contract to 2023. I think we can support the meeting next year. We can make this decision at the end of this year. Don't worry, we will have the Pumpkin meet at Netherwood Church Oct. 29th, 2022. I ask that everyone help promote this Meet. We approved gift certificates that will be given at random meetings. You could be the lucky winner if you are present. Your chances improve with each meeting you attend and if you bring an item to run or show. Good luck.

We will be having several different activities during the year. Boyd Reasor has a large layout with both O and S gauge track. The outside loop features 084 radius O gauge so it will accommodate scale engines. He has graciously invited us to come and run our trains on May 21st. NO MORE CHICAGO UNION STATION

We held our "Souper Bowl Saturday" Desert Division mid-winter auction last month in the Valley. Among the items in my personal consignment was a Chicago Union Station by TW Trainworx. This building has been on the last two versions of my layout and for over a dozen years.

So, why sell it? Here is the story. As you probably know, layouts in my basement evolve over time. So, following visits by the Train Collectors Association members during the 2009 National TCA Convention, the first major change began. And it was the result of a Lionel subway set.




I have always been fascinated by New York's subway system, but Mary Jane is not. However, at a Lionel display at a York train show, they introduced a really neat blue/silver colored new set which Mary Jane said it's "not bad". So one was ordered. But when it arrived, it dawned on me that there was no good place to run it on my "Arizona" themed main layout.

So, the then existing, "L shaped" postwar layout was taken down and a downtown "Chicago" themed layout replaced it. And that is when I discovered that TrainWorx had a beautiful Union Station building (now long gone). It became the centerpiece of that 8' by 8' layout.



In time that entire layout was replaced by the current, more urban themed, layout. It features a "big city" downtown on the central peninsula and with Union Station as the centerpiece of the two-level terminal, similar to the real station. The rest of "downtown" is sort of a mixture of Manhattan (grandparents row house), Douglas (our hometown) and Phoenix and of course, Union Station.



It worked great there, but as the rest of the buildings were completed over time, Union Station got lost behind other buildings. First, it was a muted color which did not stand out and the two side wings were only one story which also



did not show well down a street of multi-story buildings.

Last year, I decided it needed to be replaced. I looked over the internet for photos of other stations around the country and found this one: a Northern Pacific station in Livingston, Montana. It is not a classic "stationy" looking building, but its three story, red brick facade was just what I was looking for. That became my scratch building project and Union Station went back into its original box.



Downtown now has what I had wanted, a building that calls attention to itself and it was time to say goodbye to Union Station. No, it did not bring what I had hoped for at the auction, but the Atonna "train fund" now has more in it to help pay for the upcoming shipping of the new Acela train set, but that's another story.






