About 100 lots are still needed to complete the Turkey Meet Auction, which, along with the Meet will again be held at Centennial Hall in Mesa, Thanksgiving weekend.

Our Phoenix Zoo layout has proved to be a real success, running for hours daily. Chris Allen had to make an emergency "house call" as a windstorm deposited cottonwood seeds inside the Plexiglas shell, resulting in clogged motors! Ivan English announced that Gadsden-Pacific will have its Summer Meet on June 5 at the Rodeway Inn in Tucson.

National President Paul Wassermann gave a report on the 50th Anniversary Convention. It promises to be one of the largest conventions in TCA's history. Three hotels are already sold out and many others are approaching capacity. As part of the anniversary celebration the club will offer several new items. These include four USA manufactured Pride Lines items including a Trolley, Glass Dome Shed, Lamp post and a pair of clown figures. These are all gold plated. Pass the Pepto! Whew, did we eat pizza! Another 320 slices of pizza are now recorded into the annals of Desert Division lore. Thank you's to a long list of people who helped make the 9th annual Pizza Meetza such a success. Listed as my brain recalls them: Beth Stange for getting such a wide selection of pizzas at a great price, Denise Micale and my wife Laurel for staffing the coffee club, Chet Henry and his great support crew who were too numerous to mention, and of course auctioneer extraordinaire Peter Atonna.

As promised, I researched the historical records to update the pizza pie tally sheets. With this year's addition, the Desert Division continues to sit alone at the top of the pizza hilltop with a new total of 377 pies eaten for a new grand total of 3,016 slices! 
PADE PROMOTIONS

As I mentioned in my Presidents article this is truly a wonderful website and all credit is due the author and webmaster. For those of you without access to the internet I've copied the key paragraph in total "The Swiss Federal Railways had a highly electrified system during the Second World War, but retained little 0-6-0 tank engines for shunting. Due to war conditions coal was in short supply, but hydro-electricity remained plentiful. Therefore some of these small steam locomotives were converted to raise steam by electric heating. Power was taken at 15 kV, 16.6 Hz* from overhead lines by a pantograph, and fed to resistance heating elements in the boiler, via two transformers rated together at 480 kW. Water feed was by normal steam injectors. These unique locomotives also retained the capability of being fired by coal in the usual way" No April Fool story, and to my knowledge these were the only electric steam locomotive in the world.

KIDS CLUB NEWS

Here are three more thoughts on the subject of kids' collecting, edited from an article "Young Collectors" by H. Rinker.

F. Teach the child and yourself patience. Resist the temptation to rush out and buy your child dozens or hundreds of his "favorite" collectible of the moment. A child does not have to own everything he desires immediately. Allow the child to unearth his own treasures. The story behind the acquisition enhances the perceived value of any object to the collector. Further, collecting is a great deal more fun when it stretches over decades rather than months. Children's collecting interests can shift on a whim. Increase your level of support in assisting the child to add to his collection the longer he remains focused. Avoid allowing collecting to become an obsession or worse, an addiction. Collecting should never be allowed to dominate a child's life. Help your child develop a sense of perspective.



G. Encourage your child to use his own money to buy objects for his collection. Not only will he value them more, he will begin to understand that collecting requires a sacrifice. When you spend your money on an object, you do not have it to spend on something else. Ideally, collecting should be discretionary-income driven. Allow your child to make purchasing mistakes. A child often buys the first example he sees and frequently overpays. Adults know the value of comparison shopping. The child needs to learn the lesson firsthand. He will learn it when he finds a second, third, and fourth example priced well below what he paid.

Dave Brown worked long and hard to help bring the March Picnic to fruition. His reward was being named by President Chris Allen as April's Member of the Month.






