Jay set up a display featuring the 2004 end-of-year product line, with the Lionel Polar Express set which will be available prior to the November 9 opening of the movie. Other items, including a less than \$100 0-6-0 locomotive, were well received by the viewing audience. S-gaugers will have the chance to purchase a Lionel/Flyer Mikado with TMCC. Mr. Keeley then left to set up a similar display at Arizona Train Depot in Mesa.

Beth Stange has agreed to serve as chairman of the Election Committee. The Desert Division has a long history of very active elections with a high percentage of members participating. With fall comes the annual Desert Division Golf Tournament. This will be contested for the 16th year, making it the oldest continuously held tournament in the TCA. YOU CAN MAKE A DIFFERENCE

The Bylaws Committee, chaired by Keith Swett, has proposed the following changes to the current Desert Division Bylaws. Please compare the items below with your copy of our current Bylaws. Copies of the current Bylaws will be available at the next Division Meet for your perusal and comparison. These revisions are being published the third and final time in this issue of the newsletter. They will be included on the ballot for your approval in November. What appears below allows for a group of members to petition for Chapter status. It also allows the Division to have a Media/Relations Chairperson.

PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES

Change Article II Section I to Article II Section 1A.

Add sections B and C to read as follows:

- B. A Chapter may be formed by filing a petition to the Desert Division Board of Directors with the geographic boundary, proposed name, and 25 signatures pledging membership as outlined in Article II Section 1A.
- C. Final approval of the petition for Chapter formation resides with the Desert Division Board of Directors.

Change Article III Section 3 as follows:

Add the words "all Chapter officers" so that Section B reads as follows:

B. The terms of office for the Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Directors, and *all Chapter officers* shall be for one calendar year.

Reletter "C" to "D"

Reletter "D" to "E"

Reletter "E" to "F"

Insert a new section "C" as follows:

C. The elected President of a Chapter becomes a Director on the Desert Division Board of Directors.

Article VII – Add a new Section 3 as follows:

A Media Relations Chairperson shall be appointed by the President for a one-year term. He/She shall promote the growth of the Division through exposure of meets, events, and activities.

RAFFLES AND YOUR PARTICIPATION

There is, in my opinion, a huge correlation between the operation methods of a TCA Division and Public Radio. In both cases the perceived "Big Boss" provides absolutely NO financial aid, but demands adherence to all of "Big Boss's" rules and regulations. In simple terms? The Federal Government doesn't finance Public Radio and TCA National provides no financial help to any Division.

You happen to be a member of the Desert Division, one of the most active of all the twenty TCA Divisions. Some major methods of obtaining money to fund all of the membership perks happen through the use of raffles, silent auctions, and donations. Public Radio has fund-raising drives about four times a year. During these "drives" listeners are asked to determine "what the product (PBS Radio) is worth to them" in terms of dollars. The same must be asked of our membership. We pay \$10 a year in dues — nearly every penny of that money goes to support the best monthly newsletter in TCA land, the <u>Dispatch</u>. Actually, that ten dollars doesn't fully cover the cost of office preparation materials, publication, and postage.

So where does that leave us? We used to sell Entertainment Books, but now it seems as though every group sells these books. We used to take our modular layout to large shopping malls and they would pay us a fee for our services. They no longer do that, but want us to now pay them for the privilege of displaying our trains. Members used to donate unwanted trains to the Division, who in turn would sell them and pocket the receipts. Now those unwanted trains are sold on e-Bay and the member pockets the receipts. What does this leave us? Like most of the other Divisions in TCA, we could charge meet admission fees and fees for the tables used for meet sales. We choose NOT to do this for a variety of reasons.

That leaves us raffles, silent auctions, mystery boxes, and donations. All of these methods go right back to the methods employed by Public Radio. What is a Desert Division Meet worth to you?

The hobby of toy trains is not a "poor man's" endeavor. New locomotives cost from a couple hundred dollars to several thousand, regardless of manufacturer. Rolling stock and accessories are less, but rarely below a minimum of \$50 per transaction. We all seem to continue to buy, whatever the cost.

Each month the Desert Division sells raffle tickets for \$1.00 each or 10 for \$5.00. There is a nice prize available to the lucky few whose tickets are selected. The more tickets you buy, the better the chances of winning. Basically I view the raffle

tickets as a monthly <u>donation</u> of \$5.00 to the Desert Division. If one of my tickets is selected, great! If not, I've made a <u>donation</u> to an organization whose ideals and activities I cherish and enjoy. The five dollars is not going to make or break my life style and I honestly don't think it is going to affect any others of us who attend or would like to attend.

As for the Silent Auction item, and out and out donations, just a small explanation is needed. The Silent Auction items are indigenous to the Desert Division – in other words, they are collectible toy train pieces not available at any other meet anywhere in TCA. They are nice pieces for your collection and definitely can be a centerpiece for your layout or special showcase.

Donations to the club are precisely as the word implies, a contribution which is tax deductible, as we are a registered 501c3 organization. Be it money or merchandise, the Division Secretary would be very glad to provide you with an acknowledgment of your donation to put with your tax records.

There you have it - a few ways that you may help the Division financially and also help yourself as well. Your donation is truly a gift that DOES keep on giving.











Researching trivia questions on the web can be fun, and often I find so much information about a particular subject available that some of my journeys go down some unusual paths. While researching famous and not so famous train wrecks of the Desert Southwest, I came across a mention of train wrecks and Russian Thistle. Can you recall a Western movie or TV show that didn't have tumbleweed blowing down a dusty street or in the corners of the OK Corral? Russian Thistle entered the United States in contaminated flax seed in the late 1870's by Ukrainian farmers in South Dakota, and from there the plant spread throughout the West like wildfire. Contaminated seed was shipped or carried by early settlers. There are numerous reports of a "fresh crop" appearing on the sites of train wrecks where boxcars were overturned, and along the wagon train trails where loads were lightened either voluntarily or by raiders. Not that tumbleweeds need any help, the plant itself is most prodigious with an average of 200,000 seeds per plant, and reports indicate that some have traveled more than 50 miles in 24 hours. Since agriculture records were routinely kept, the migration across the plains and into the Southwest have been easily documented. Reports from Arizona had the territory tumbleweed free until 1903 when the first reports came of the trail into and out of Fort Whipple near Prescott becoming impassable due to tumbleweeds blocking the way. So since the first report was in 1903, and the shootout down Tombstone way happened in 1881, all those tumbleweeds you've seen in the movies could not have been there, historically speaking that is. A small anecdote has the Hopi name for this western icon as the "white man's plant."

But let's not stop there. As I said, doing research on the internet can lead you to some unlikely information. I've had a fondness for cowboy western music ever since I grew up listening to Gene Autry and Roy Rogers yodel away a Saturday afternoon at the movie house. It seems that the writer of the song "Tumbling Tumbleweeds," Bob Nolan, had originally written the song in 1932 as "Tumbling Leaves" on a rainy Tucson afternoon. Bob later, as a founding member of the group The Sons of the Pioneers, rewrote the song to better fit the group's Western image and it quickly became their now famous theme song.

Oh yes, one last totally useless bit of tumbleweed trivia. At ground zero in the Nevada desert, the first plant to grow back after an above or below ground nuclear test? You guessed it – Russian Thistle! Pretty ironic, no?
