There are still plenty of things to do this summer. I met many of you a few weeks ago at the Grand Canyon Model Railroaders Summer Cactus Meet. And hope to run into many more of you at the Central Arizona Model Railroad Club's "Beat the Heat Meet" coming up in mid-August.

After hosting two and getting ready to help in our third National TCA Convention, the end of June each year is something I look forward to. Laurel and I head off to a different city and look forward to learning about a new area of the country and hanging out with the many friends we've made in this hobby over the past several decades. This past year was a return trip to the city of Pittsburgh, a city we last visited in 2004. For

those of you who do not attend National Conventions let me encourage you to add this to your summer travel plans.

As usual we fly to the convention city and take an airport shuttle to the host hotel. Our flight this time had a few extra delays and when we arrived at the Wyndham Grand Downtown Hotel we just collapsed into bed. If you follow the Desert Division on facebook we reported quite a bit from the convention that week. The public layouts were spectacular and in every gauge from HO up to G and Standard Gauge. Most were very user interactive with a lot of exciting scenes that came to life with the push of a button.

The night before the Board of Directors meets, the hosting Chapter or Division usually holds an informal social get-together for us. This provides all the officers and Division Presidents a great venue to relax and get reacquainted prior to our board meetings the following days. For some of us it is a chance to answer questions about upcoming business at the BOD meetings, for others it is a chance to relax before getting down to business, for me it's a mixture of both.

This past convention the social was held at the home of John DeSantis. John is a well know collector within the ranks of TCA and his home and collection provided our own personal highlight of our trip and the convention week. John is the ultimate host and having a chance to once again visit his beautifully restored Victorian home was a treat all in itself. Of course, his collection speaks is world famous and John freely answers all questions about the variations he has collected and tips for those of us still on the prowl to add to our own collection.

The following morning the Board of Directors Meeting began. If you read the minutes from the Board of Directors Meeting they can be confusing and maybe to some, a bit boring, so let me give you the highlights of what happened and the news of what was reported.

One of the first things on the agenda was a Request for Proposal (RFP) for a complete reworking of the TCA National websites. This proposal called for extensive updating of not just the national members website, but also the National Toy Train Museum and the Toy Train Reference Library as well. Most tourists in the area are using smartphones to access family attractions in the area and our websites have not kept up with the times. Since this RFP is web based, the request can be implemented by any company nationwide. The BOD agreed and the RFP is currently out looking for companies to respond. If you know of a web design company

that would like a copy of the TCA RFP have them contact me and I will forward it to them.

Next item up was the budget. Well, let me jump back a step and report our membership numbers since they play a pivotal role in the budget process. At the convention, our total TCA membership reported was 22,902. Breaking the numbers down we have 237 Life Members, 920 Honor Role Members, 27 Heritage Members, 28 Junior Members, and 65 Trial Members. I'll report on Kid's Club in another section of the newsletter.

Although the numbers might look a bit down, they are relatively unchanged year-to-year. The TCA Board of Directors has been working very hard the past five years changing the business model of the Association. New classes of membership have been implemented and are beginning to take root. "Idle" money in investment accounts (CD's) that were drawing little return have been moved into more higher yielding accounts, while at the same time diversifying them to remain fully insured. The new Heritage Membership (Desert Division has two Heritage Members of the 27 nationwide) and other fundraising efforts from the METCA Division matching funds challenge have secured the beginning of TCA's Endowment Fund.

For each of the past five years, the proposed budget has been approved with a modest cash surplus, which was met each time. This year's budget forecast is to again post a modest savings. Why is this good news for you? By continuing to keep expenses trimmed while looking to increase non-dues income in other areas, there will be no need for a dues increase for the next several years.

Once the budget was put to bed, the BOD moved onto other topics. The 2020 Convention bid for Jacksonville Florida was approved. The current 2017 NETCA Convention cars are currently available for purchase. Remember the sale of these convention cars now ends in October so don't delay if you would like to own one. There is a unique Ben & Jerry's Ice Cream reefer in S gauge and great graphics on a G gauge beer reefer available. I reported on the plans for the 2019 TCA Convention in Albuquerque. At \$99 a night we will have one of the lowest room rates in recent history. (continued on Page 4.)

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TCA Desert Division BOD Meeting

To keep with the theme of this month's issue, the June BOD Minutes will be published in the September issue.

Other convention news impacted us directly as the Rio Grande Chapter gets ready to host the 2019 Convention. Registration is typically handled by the hosting convention. A change that was approved during the Board of Directors meeting was that TCA National would begin handling convention registration from now on. The devil is in the details, but one of the biggest obstacles and hardest to learn for each convention committee is the registration software. This change now puts it in the hands of the TCA Business Office. Although there will still need to be the local support "boots on the ground" during the convention week, the workload has been greatly reduced. More details will be forthcoming as the initial kinks get worked out of the system and we get ready to handle the 2019 registration which is only 16 months away.

Next it was approved that deaccessed items from the Toy Train Museum could be made available to future conventions for auction. These deaccessed items would now be available to a wider group of our membership as the conventions travel around the country. Currently they are only available to those members who travel to the National Toy Train Museum Open House at the York Meet.

Recognizing the hard work that many put into the Association, the process and criteria for the President's Award was approved. In addition, several new classes of Benefactor Awards were defined and approved. Patrons and Benefactors of TCA, the National Toy Train Museum and the Toy Train Reference Library will now receive recognition with a plaque in the atrium area of the TCA headquarters campus. Like the brick program that is nearly complete, these awards will allow TCA to continue to list the individuals, Division, Chapters and business's that financially support TCA.

The Kid's Club program is undergoing a big change over the next year. First, and most importantly although often overlooked is the simple fact that Kid's Club is exactly that, a club. TCA does have a Junior Membership for those under the age of 18, but this class of membership is really for those young adults who are heavily involved in the hobby. Kid's Club is still free while Junior Members pay reduced yearly dues to stay active on the rolls.

One of the biggest obstacles facing Kids Club was the sharp falloff once these Club members

became teens. With Junior Membership now in place, Kid's Club is reinventing itself into two separate groups with those 12 years of age and younger staying in the original Kid's Club. Those 13 years and older will now be enrolled into TCA Teens. The work will be challenging as this new concept continues to evolve. TCA Teens hopes to involve already established youth train groups into the Association. If this happens we should see the ranks of Junior membership grow over the upcoming years. It's an ambitious project, but another way we look to involve today's youth that have already shown an interest in the hobby. The BOD approved that those Junior Members who convert to Regular Members at their 18th birthday pay the reduced rate of 50% Regular Membership dues until they attain their 24th birthday.

One motion was soundly defeated, and it was something we talked about earlier this year at our own meetings. It was proposed that all voting in future TCA elections be 100% electronic. With rising paper, printing, and postage costs the Internet Committee was tasked to find a way to reduce these costs. Adding electronic voting to the existing process would increase the cost, so the proposal was to convert to 100% electronic voting instead. As the Chairman of the Internet Committee and the originator of the motion, I heard time and again from officers and other Division President's that this was a bad idea and we would alienate our membership if implemented. Just as the passions ran high at our meeting over taking this newsletter 100% electronic, speaker after speaker voiced concerns about an all-electronic election. As I mentioned this motion was defeated, but later in the meeting I announced that the Internet Committee would revisit the electronic voting issue and present a new motion in 2018 that we feel could provide and either/or option for voting at no cost increase to the budget. It won't be the proposed \$15,000 annual savings that all-electronic voting would have achieved, but it will be a step in the right direction. As more members choose this option TCA should begin to realize additional savings.

So that is my report from the 63rd TCA National Convention. I'm sure you will have additional questions to ask so bring them to the September meeting on September 9th. Until then stay cool and I hope to see you at the Beat the Heat Meet in Prescott Valley later this month.

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HARVEY CAR UPDATE




