we had the free coffee and donuts ready for everyone to enjoy.

President Allen called the Business Meeting to order at 10:05 AM. Secretary Angelo Lautazi announced our current paid membership at 217. John Wiley had his daughter Dawn as a guest and granddaughter Charlotte Coon helped Grandma Allen with coffee club duties and donut quality assurance. Treasurer Bob Herman gave the financial report of Savings Account balance \$19,805.84 and Checking Account balance of \$7,541.06. Chris noted that the reduction in the checking account was the yearly payment for the trailer module storage and a \$4,000 transfer of funds to the 2019 Convention Committee based on very strong car sales last month. In fact, less than 30 Fred Harvey Trading Co. cars remain.

The only Old Business to discuss was the search for a new Christmas Holiday Party venue continues. Both members and the committee felt a change in venue was overdue because of several incidents during last years event. This year the final selection has been narrowed to the central Phoenix area.

New Business, the current year's roster had been mailed out and Chris asked for a reaction to the new laminated membership card. The overall response was positive and because the cost was minimal it will be continued again next year. Chris also mentioned that the club is investigating its own fund-raising program using the Lionel Made in USA cars. Several ideas have already been discussed with the first car a smaller run featuring the La Posada Hotel in Williams. We are already in discussion with them and hope to have an announcement over the summer.

With all the business out of the way the meeting was turned over to the Educational segment early so that we could end on time for the Pizza arrival scheduled at 11:00. Jerry Sienkewicz started things off with several unique prototypes. Jerry is a long time Marx collector and has traveled far and wide to add to his collection. The first was a copper plated engine that came from an antique toy show in Illinois more than 25 years ago while the second, a 1953 crossing gate that was never produced crossing gate from a York meet so far back he couldn't remember. Tim Halchuck related that he has seen a lot of articles about Delta Line products in TCA publications recently and decided to bring in his examples. His were made from plans

found in a 1943 Lionel Builder Magazine. Tim had reproductions of the articles and everyone agreed they were very vague and his finished buildings were spot on. Roland LaHaie had his footlocker of trains. He explained that when he was seven years old his father was going to be deployed overseas, so the family had Christmas in August. They introduced him to the Gadsen Pacific Museum and then the bug really bit. Ivan's first train was the beautiful Lionel Southern Pacific Daylight. Paul Wassermann's first train was a Lionel #111 Scout set and was given to him by his Polish Grandmother in 1948 when he was 5 years old. He played with the set, rather hard by his own admission, and sold it when he was 15. Paul has told us many times that meeting Dr. Don Fraley during his internship was the "sparkplug" that got him back into the hobby and it took him 30 years of searching to find another set to replace that original. **Don Locke's** father worked as a contractor for the railroad and bought him his first set a Lionel 1947 freight set when he was 10 years old. Don not only has that same set but also the same 1947 Lionel catalog that he "wished" over. Don recalled many fond memories of tagging along with his father and experiencing railroad life first hand.

<u>Approval of Previous Meetings Minutes</u> – The minutes from the previous meeting were approved.

<u>Secretary's Report</u> - Angelo reported that membership stands at 217 members. We picked up two late member renewals after the roster was printed.

<u>Treasurers Report</u> - Treasurer Bob Herman reported that the Savings Account is \$19,805.84 and Checking is \$7,541.06.26. Bob distributed the Income & Expense report from February. Bob noted that the checking account decline reflects several large payments including payment of the two storage lockers for the club module trailer and auction storage along with check of \$4,000 sent to the Rio Grande Chapter Convention fund from car sales. 2019 Division Roster – The roster was recently mailed to the membership and Chris asked the BOD about the new laminated membership card. The cost to do the lamination was minimal but he wondered if we needed a membership card at all? The Board was split so Chris will bring the matter up with the members at the meeting on Saturday for a consensus.

<u>May Pizza Meet</u> - Beth is in charge of ordering the pizzas. Janet Mattern will not be able to bring sodas because she will be away on an Anniversary Cruise. Laurel will help set the coffee in the morning and insure enough soda and water for lunch. Angelo will ask Barbara to assist. The auction lot will be over 100 pieces.

New Business:

<u>Email Scam</u> – Bob received another request for money so to avoid any more email scams, we have shut down the treasurer's email account on the website.

<u>Hudson Raffle</u> – Chris authorized Gordon Wilson to purchase a Hudson for the Division's 2019 raffle while they were at York. Gordon also found a boxed 1964 Hudson that could be used for the 2019 Convention. Chris authorized that purchase as well. If the 2019 Convention decides not to use the Hudson we will sell the boxes and use the Hudson for the 2020 raffle.

2019 Banquet Car – Chris signed the 2019 Banquet car contract from Lionel for a limited 150 piece run.

<u>Christmas Holiday Party</u> – The Christmas party location needs to be decided on within the next month. Chris has compiled a list of possible locations from hotels that had meeting rooms large enough for our train shows. Paul agreed to go through the list and begin contacting them as a possible venue. While at York Chris stopped by the Barclay booth and found several figures that might work as a member gift. The Christmas Party Committee will decide to use the member gift in lieu of the grab bag gifts we did last year.

<u>Division Fund Raising</u> - Chris opened up the discussion mentioning that several other Division presidents have mentioned that fund raising club cars seem to be the way many are going. Peter Atonna is working on a Harvey House car that would celebrate the La Posada hotel in Winslow. Several other projects are also being developed. With minimum runs of 100 units available from Lionel, a relatively fast turnaround, and a made in America product, it makes it more feasible to produce a car that will be sold out and not burden the club with unsold inventory. The club will try to produce at least one car a year.

2019 Convention Tour - Sandia Peak Tramway

If you have ever visited Albuquerque, or even travelled through this beautiful city on I-40 you have seen the picturesque Sandia Mountains on the eastern side of the city. There are two popular versions of how this mountain range may have gotten their name. In Spanish, sandia means watermelon, so perhaps the mountains were called that by the early explorers because of the ranges reddish hues during the late afternoons and sunsets. The more plausible answer appears to be when these same explorers encountered the pueblo of the native people in the area they referred to them as the Sandia's because of the squash gourds they were growing in the fertile Rio Grande Valley closely resembled watermelons. The name of the native people in the area soon transferred over to the nearby mountains. However they were given their name, they are one of the most colorful ranges in such a close proximity to any city TCA has ever visited for a convention.

Albuquerque is over a mile high in elevation pretty much wherever you go in the city. At the base of the tramway you gain some additional elevation and are at 6,559' before you even begin your ascent. The view from here is pretty spectacular already. There is a small gift shop and Sandiago's, a fine dining restaurant, known for breathtaking sunset and nighttime views.

The trip, or flight as it is called by the operators of the tramway, takes about 15 minutes to get to the top observation deck. It is located at an elevation of 10,378'. If you fly into Albuquerque you might recall the pilot telling you that the aircraft has reached 10,000' and you can turn



your electronic devices on in airplane mode. Well, imagine looking down at an aircraft from your view on the deck.

Although you are not really at "the" Sandia Peak, you have an astounding 11,000 square mile view of the Rio Grande Valley and the Land of Enchantment from the Observation Deck. That's an area larger than eight U.S. states, or Rhode Island, Delaware, and Connecticut combined.

The tramway itself is quite an engineering marvel and is the longest aerial tramway in the United States and the third longest in the world. At the time of our visit last year, the restaurant at the top was being remodeled. We have two tours scheduled for the tramway, an evening tour which will include a flight to the top observation deck to view the sunset and then dinner at one of the restaurants or a day trip which would include the Nuclear Science Museum and a lunch stop.

The tramway, tramcars, and the top observation deck are fully ADA and wheelchair accessible. We made the trip with Convention Chairs Scott and Elaine Eckstein and had a spectacular time checking out the views, snow, and slopes since it was still ski season and the deck is also the base for the wintertime Sandia Peak Ski Area. Although Laurel is afraid of heights, she braved the trip in the tramcar by staying in the center of the car for the journey and not really looking around until she got to the top. Once there, we all were rewarded with a spectacular view. In the summertime it is possible to see anything from mountain bikers to hang gliders enjoying the elevation and view of a lifetime.

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Somerset County 4-H Trainmasters WIU Addition

Since 2011, my first year in the Trainmasters club, I have noticed that MTH DCS's signal was not as reliable as Lionel TMCC's signal. Being that I had, and still do, mostly MTH locomotives, it was a shame for me not to bring my engines to the club shows. In 2014, MTH Electric Trains released new technology that allowed the operator to control his / her trains from a smart device. The main component of this new technology was the Wi-Fi Interface Unit (WIU). This device allows operators to control trains from any smart device (phone or tablet) running IOS or Android. When I got my own WIU, I noticed how much better it was than the DCS remote. The screen was in full color. I was able to use more features, it was easier to use, and the signal was much stronger. The idea never really occurred to me to get the WIUs for our club until late spring 2017.



Before I explain the process of how our club got the WIUs I would like to explain how the WIU works. The app on your device "talks" with the WIU. For example, if you want your engine to go 10 SMPH, the WIU translates the message from your device to the TIU (Track Interface Unit) with a USB cable. The command is then sent to the locomotive with the two wires connected to each track. The smart app is not limited to running trains. With this app, one can run conventional engines, any MTH engine, operate accessories, throw switches, diagnose wiring, check the track signal and even run Lionel TMCC and Legacy engines! To summarize, the app performs all

the functions of the DCS remote while being intuitive.

Once you have downloaded the app, open the app and tap "run my trains". When wanting to select an engine, tap the arrow at the top right corner. Scroll to "Add engine", then "Add MTH engine" The TIU will now start reading the track for any engines. When an engine has been found, tap on it, and then press "Run this engine" Once you have added the engine, tap "Startup" to start running trains! In order to add a Lionel engine, follow a similar process but it requires a few extra steps to program.

I first made the pitch to our club leader, Jim Wood at the end of June 2016. He was skeptical at first, but after a few minutes, I was able to convince him to allow the club to take a vote. For our July business meeting, I prepared notes and a short presentation about the WIU and then told the club. The club voted to get the WIUs, which was \$620 in total. We were not only going to need the WIUs, but new TIUs to replace our outdated ones. After the club voted, Mr. Kevin Quinn, President of the Metropolitan Division of TCA, suggested that I make a presentation to the METCA board about financial assistance.

At the annual Somerset County 4-H Fair in August, I made a presentation to METCA asking for their financial assistance in purchasing the WIUs. During the presentation, I explained how the WIUs worked, why we needed them, and how they would

make running trains on our layout easier and a more enjoyable experience. METCA agreed, and they generously gifted us \$620 to pay for the WIUs.

After the fair, I realized that implementing this new technology would not be easy. We would need to figure out how to program, update, and install these devices within a few months. I turned to the OGR Forum, where many people helped answer my questions. I also read selected parts of the full DCS Wi-Fi Companion book for more information. We needed to have the mainline WIU and yard WIU act as one and be able to use Lionel Legacy with our system. After a few weeks of researching, the WIUs were ready to be installed.

Before the January show, I hosted a meeting at my house to show to the senior members and leaders of our club how the WIU worked. Each member and leader had the opportunity to use the new technology themselves. I showed them how to

install the app, program engines, and run trains so we would be able to assist other members at the show. Everyone thought that it worked very well and that it would be a big improvement to our other system.

The January show came quickly. We were





going to be installing two WIUs and two new TIUs from METCA. In addition, we were installing Lionel Legacy instead of TMCC for the first time. The setup process went very smoothly. After setup, I took an MTH engine and put it on the layout for the maiden voyage. The WIU performed extremely well. Throughout the weekend, I brought my MTH Trains that had never been to the layout. I did not run a single Lionel engine throughout the entire weekend.

I would like to thank Jim Wood and METCA for all of their support for without them this whole project would never have happened. I would also like to thank all the club members for their continued support and believing that there would be a new way to run MTH trains on our layout.


