Secretary Lautazi reported Division membership at 184 members, but 36 members still are remiss in paying dues. The cutoff was March 31. On a positive note we were happy to resign Randy Efros as a returning member. Randy was active in the club and dropped for several years and is back as a dues paying member. THE TIME MACHINE

No, I am not going to write a story about H.G. Wells, or a story about the 1960's Star Trek episode about time travel to the 1930s'. This article is about how you can go back in time and have a great time doing it. The way to go back in time is to play with your old toys. This time travel event for me was the purchase and operation of a Lionel Set# 751, the M-10000.

The story begins for me in 1963. I was 12 and would always go to the New Mexico State Fair every September. I lived close to the fair and would arrive after school and would stay at the Model Railroad Building almost until it closed. Soon the Albuquerque Railroad Club members noticed me and invited me into the inside of the display. The Display was NMRA O Scale 2 rail. It was very large and impressed a 12-year-old. The next year I became a Junior member, and my sponsor was Russell Mead.

Now it was me that was running the trains during the State Fair. The train I loved to run was the Lionel M-10000. The rest of the club did not like the train because it was so fast and caused problems with operation. It was owned by Russ Mead. I just loved that train the Lionel M-10000. I moved to California in late 1967. After College I arrived back in Albuquerque in 1973. Mr. Mead had passed away and I knew his trains were gone. I had a great surprise, in December, when I once again found the original M-10000.

It did not run, and it was converted to 2 rail DC so I had my work cut out for me. I wanted it to run again at a show where people could watch it like back in 1965 which was the last time it ran at the State Fair. I had to re-wire the Motor, remove the DC to AC rectifiers, put in new brushes, clean the armature, and clean and lube all the gears. I also had to pull all the wheels, and axles on the

Motor and Vestibules. Then replace all of them with Lionel wheels. In the photo of the wheels you can see the difference of the wheel flanges. The Wheel on the left is the new Lionel Wheel, the one on the right is a Lionel wheel ground down to a NMRA scale flange. As you can see it is a real big difference.



I also had to wire each vestibule with a wire and connectors because I needed the power for the lights to come from the Motor. There were no pickups on the vestibules because they were changed to 2 rail pickup. I spent about 20 hours on the project. I got it to operate and took it to the February TTOS New Mexico Swap Meet and Show. They have a large Module Layout with 072 track.

I was able to run it for over an hour nonstop. It was fantastic to think of the hours already on the motor and gears and another hour did not even phase this 1935 Motor. What a thrill. I went back in time, back to 1965. The smiles on the crowds face as they watched the Lionel M-10000 go around made me smile.

Going back in time is easy if you have the right stuff. Your Toys and Toy Trains. Play with them and go back in time.

Review of the Lionel Lionchief Alco RS-3 #6-84697 and Bluetooth Control Part 1

This will not be one of those sugarcoated reviews that you find in the standard model toy train magazines. I am going to give you the good, the bad and ugly. Lionel is not providing me free rolling stock and I have not been paid to do this review. So here it is the unbiased report.

Late in 2019, Lionel introduced what they called Lionchief Bluetooth 2.0. The new generation added TMCC and legacy control to Bluetooth products and Bluetooth to all Legacy Locomotives. This made the regular Lionchief Bluetooth less desirable and retailers were offering sustainable discounts. So, when prices dropped by 30% and more in line with the true worth of this engine, I thought it was time to test the Lionel Bluetooth system. Since I have had this RS-3 for a little over a year, I thought I would share my experience.

Bluetooth is a third command control system adopted by Lionel. It is another form of Radio control however it

does not need the outside rail to transmit commands but rather sends commands through air waves. Initially, Lionel used TMCC. This was modified with additional features and called Legacy. Bluetooth was first introduced for entry level locomotives but now it is incorporated in all of Lionel offerings. Bluetooth now allows operation via smart phone app as well as a remote controller and conventional.

The Prototype and the Lionel Model.

The model is based on the Alco RS-3 road switcher. About 1400 RS-3s were produced between 1950-1956. The RS-3, an upgrade to the RS-2, was built to compete with the Baldwin DRS -4-4-1500, EMD GP7 and the FM H-15-444. The RS-2 suffered from reliability problems and the RS-3 was modified to address these problems. The 244 turbocharged v-12 was modified to increase the horsepower by 100 to 1600. This was 100 more hp than the RS-2, and the competitors. The RS-3

was 56' long and 10' wide. It was initially purchased by several railroads; however, Santa Fe was not one of these buyers. Examples of this locomotive are still in service today in Brazil.

The model was produced to scale measuring 14" x 2 ½ "and is in Santa Fe livery with safety stripes. The cast in detail is impressive including fans and hatches and grills accurately reproduced in the plastic body. The lettering is superb including the fine lettering of the engine 2099. The only criticism would be the stamped metal side rails but they are thinner than the old postwar style and barely noticeable because of the excellent safety stripe paint scheme. Ultimately you have to recognize that this is an entry level product so expectations should be adjusted accordingly. The stamped rails could end up saving the model from rough play. At the end of the day, most people would be happy with this representative model. After all, you are running on three rails which are a scale 5' rather than 4' 81/2". The size of the model would be it at home on any size layout large or small.

Operation.

As I mentioned, Lionel's Bluetooth allows you to operate in any one of three modes, smart phone app either iPhone or android, a separate included remote or conventional. Additionally, just introduced is Lionel voice control which is part of the phone app. On the underside of the locomotive, you will find switches to control smoke, conventional vs command, sound on or off. I found the operation to be excellent. I did not extensively test this

in conventional because Lionel's included controller does all the functions of conventional plus you can operate the front and rear couplers anywhere on your layout. Additionally, you have much finer speed control than you would on any transformer. I can't imagine why you would ever want to use conventional operation but it is there for those who still want it.

Now we are ready to run the Alco in command mode. Once you apply power to the track, the engine will beep, and lights will flash. I find this a little annoying, but it is a minor point. As soon as you connect with the remote or the app the Alco starts with that throaty Alco idle. Although I have never heard an RS-3 in person, it is right on when I watch videos of the real Alco. The second thing that you will notice is the degree of speed control. In my opinion, the most important aspect of a switcher is the ability to creep along at slow speed. This switcher creeps along at a slow speed reviling any other loco on my roster. Since I can't measure speed, I would guess the low speed to be 2 mph. On the high end, the top speed will reach allow you to jump 031 curves with ease (don't ask how I know).

Another point of interest to many operators, is how many cars can the Alco pull. I did not have a way to test pull so I hooked up five 2500 postwar Lionel passenger cars. The RS-3 pulled those with ease. As a comparison, some of my postwar steamers struggled with this consist.

As I mentioned, there are multiple ways to control this switcher. Conventional operation which I just confirmed it responded to throttle, horn and bell. The second method is the included controller. This includes forward and reverse via dial which is much finer control than I could achieve conventionally. Other controls included horn, bell, announcements and control of front and rear couplers. Also, there is a forward/ reverse button which will change direction and the engine will stop moving. Lionel sells a version of the remote that allows you to control up to three engines with a single controller.

The advantages of a remote are that you can move around the layout while operating your Lionchief. Thus, you can get up close to the log bin, milk car or other accessory to oversee operations. Further, you can control the couplers at any point on the layout. This opens all kinds of operating possibilities and saves having to have use uncoupling tracks. I have read testimony from other owners Bluetooth greatly increased the ease of operating the switcher. They were having much more fun shuttling and operating accessories. Thirdly, announcements can be played either sitting or running to enhance your experience in the hobby. Finally, you can allow your observers to participate in the fun by operating a separate locomotive.

The next way to control Bluetooth is with the free phone app. It takes only a minute or two to download and makes your phone additional super controller. Even if you don't have a smart phone probably your guests (son or daughter) will have one. Rather than just watch you run trains; they can participate. With the app you have all the functions of the remote plus a many more options. For instance, you brought your trains to run with the club modules, you have it set up and running for the onlookers. However, you forgot to turn off the smoke. Rather than stop the action, you simply shut the smoke of from the app. On my layout, I always run my trains at less than full volume but the modules are so noisy that I have to adjust to full volume when I run with the train Normally I forget to adjust the volume until the locomotive is up and

running. Rather than stop the action and take the engine off the track, again I can use the app.

Other functions on the app include: Maximum speed control (a nice feature when a young one comes to operate). Individual volume for horn, announcements and engine volume. Momentum can be adjusted between High, Medium, and low (you can simulate heavy loads and the engine will be slower to respond). Showing a picture of this App would be meaningless. You need a video of the Lionchief plus in operation and you can find many on You Tube. If you have not seen these locomotives in action, just search You Tube Lionchief plus.

At this point, I am pleased with my foray into Bluetooth and would highly

recommend you consider adding one of these engines to your roster. If you do not have any command control / radio control engines, there is no additional wiring, no systems to buy and very little to learn. The result is a significant new operating experience for you and your layout audience.

In part two, we will explore running the Alco with conventional engines on the same track. I mentioned that the Lionel app allows for voice control and additional capabilities at no charge. I will also talk about some maintenance issues and my long term experience. So be prepared for the unbiased review and questions never asked by the Lionel supported magazines.

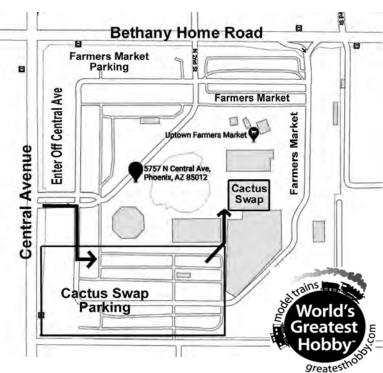
