On June 6, 1944, I have no idea what the "D" in D-Day meant, but I surely do for June 28, 2009. That is the date of the opening of the 55th TCA National Convention, which we are hosting. The "D" stands for the most important person on each and every trip/tour we are offering. There are 23 of these trips and each bus must have a representative from this Division to act as a guide, or in proper parlance, you will be a "DOCENT." We will need one DOCENT on each bus, so if a tour has five bus loads of conventioneers, there will be 5 DOCENTS from the Desert Division going on that tour.

What are a DOCENT's duties? As soon as the Convention information is released, look through the list of tours and see which ones you'd like to assist us with - we cannot guarantee you'll get what you want - we will promise we'll be fair as fair can be. We'll also supply you with as much information as we have so you can look and sound knowledgeable to the rest of the people on the tour. You will need to give your name to Ralph Treichel and tell him you wish to be a DOCENT.

As much as we'd like to say you don't have to pay Registration fees, trip fees, Welcome Party fees, room fees, and Banquet fees, those charges are out of our hands. They're controlled by the TCA National and EVERYONE must pay them, from Katie, the Division President, to Chris and Christie, who are National Officers.

Gordon and Christie have put all these trips together. Any questions you have should be directed toward them. If we can't answer, we will find out the answer for you. Husbands and wives may sign up for the same trip, but we may have need to split you up; i.e., on different buses, both going to the same site. This is a real way to help the Division and to get to meet visitors from around the country/world as you spread some real Desert Division Hospitality.

LIONEL SERVICE STATIONS

I came to Maricopa County, Arizona, in February of 1988. Immediately I discovered that words I used on the East Coast in New Jersey had a very different meaning in Arizona. A "sack," for instance, where I grew up was a burlap bag which held feed for farm animals. Out here, it was a relatively small paper bag that held food stuffs at the Super Market. In other words many words were relative, according to where they were being used. "Hot," to a New Jerseyite would conjure up temperatures in the 80's. To someone in Maricopa County, Arizona, "hot" meant the temperature was probably in excess of 105 degrees.

This "relativity" exists in the train world too. Take the Lionel idea of ordaining a certain train store as a "Service Center." To achieve that status in days of yore, first of all you had to Sell Lionel Trains, almost exclusively. None of that stuff by a competitor was allowed, or at least not much of it. American Flyer and Marx were tolerated; American Flyer in pre-war because it used 3-rail track, and Marx because its couplers were mostly compatible with Lionel's.

Some years ago a close friend of mine, Richard Bimmer, opened a part-time business at his home called Antiques and Trains. The antiques were handled by his wife, Connie, a gourmet Italian cook, and Rich took care of the trains in a converted parlor which adjoined the family room. This was where Connie had her Antique Business. It wasn't long before Rich applied for the title of "Official Approved Lionel Service Station," as there were no other such facilities in Southern New Jersey. The closest ones were across the Delaware River in Philadelphia and its environs. To get such a title, one needed the endorsement of "Mr. Lionel," the late. great, Lenny Dean. Even though Lionel was in the process of closing down their factories in New Jersey and moving to Michigan, they were still planning on operating and doing business as usual. Rich had gotten his training in the repair business first through Scholl's Electric in Bordentown, New Jersey, a longtime Lionel and American Flyer Service Station, and then later, as a business partner with Joseph Rudley at a toy train store on the Admiral Wilson Boulevard near Camden, New Jersey, in the 1950's and 1960's. The basement of Rich's home is where he kept the majority of the train inventory and parts. It was these parts that caused "Lenny" to comment, "Why Mr. Bimmer, it seems as though you have more parts than we do!" Needless to say, being named and granted an Approved Lionel Service Station was just a formality. A bit of irony would attach itself to this Service Station less than 10 years later. However, more about that when it happens. Recently I purchased an uncatalogued 1948 Lionel Train Set from Rich. As many of you know, I am a "paper collector" and sure enough there was an absolutely perfect piece of paper included with this set that listed all of the 1948 Approved Lionel Service Stations. I was truly amazed by how many there were just 3 years after World War II and equally dumbfounded by their locations.

As I compared the Service Stations in the United States of 1948 with those of 50 years later, some rather interesting facts come to the fore. Not all of the country (USA) was covered in 1948. Only 44 of the 48 states had Service Stations, and of those, four (Arizona, Montana, Nevada, Vermont) had just one Approved Service Station, while five others (Arkansas, Delaware, Maine, New Hampshire, Oregon) had but two Service Stations. Hawaii and Alaska had not yet attained Statehood, but Hawaii had an Approved Service Station and was carried among the list of Foreign Service Stations. For whatever reason, Canada was not included on the 1948 list of Foreign Service Stations. What seems even more interesting is that on the list taken from www.Lionel.com on Sunday, December 7, 2009, there are no Foreign Service Stations listed at all. with or without Canada's inclusion. This seems a bit unusual since Lionel Trains openly uses the Canadian market to merchandise their product.

In 1982 I was working for Antique Trains, whose name had gone from Antiques and Trains to simply Antique Trains. Rich had retired from his full time day job with the Reynolds Aluminum Company and was now devoting his time to the toy train hobby. Connie had come along into the Toy Train business, tending to the financial end of it, giving up on the Antiques part of what had been a part-time business for both of them. I was working full time as a music educator and two other men also had full time jobs, but would work with Rich, doing repairs on a parttime basis. I was a part-time sales person and track manufacturer. I bring all this up because Rich bought out the toy train part of a business from the man who got him started in the hobby many years before. Ed Scholl, owner of Scholl's Electric Service in Bordentown, New Jersey, decided to retire.

Here is where the "irony" comes in, that I mentioned earlier. Mr. Scholl had been a Lionel and American Flyer dealer for some 45 years. If one were to add Ed's starting date onto Rich's starting date as a Lionel dealer and Service Center, now that Madison Hardware in New York: Lee's Train Service in Oakland, California; and the Treasure House in Garfield, New Jersey; are gone, it just might be that Rich's Service Center, by attrition, is close to #1. I do know that it took three of us filling up two Cadillac Fleetwoods and one Ford Econoline Van to the brim, each of 5 consecutive nights and driving from Bordentown to Turnersville, New Jersey, to haul all of Ed Scholl's inventory to Rich's home. It then took the rest of the summer to separate and catalog it all. That was a first-hand way to learn about Lionel Pre-War, Post-War, MPC, and American Flyer from Chicago, New Haven, and the start of Detroit, Michigan.

The mention of Michigan and Detroit brings one gigantic question to my mind. In the list of Approved Service Stations prior to 1970, there are none in the Detroit area. I must plead ignorance to the location of General Mills, the large conglomerate that bought Lionel, but I must assume that it must have been somewhere near 23 Mile Road, just north of Detroit. One thing I shall have to do is a "Google Search" of General Mills to find out for sure where their corporate headquarters were located. If not near Detroit, what possible reason would Lionel have for moving from New Jersey to Michigan? Both states are pro-Union – I have been a member of the AFL-CIO since the age of 14, when I joined the American Federation of Musicians. I grew up in New Jersey.

In 2000 I paid a visit to Buenos Aires, Argentina, where a TCA friend of mine served as my personal guide. Jorges Ricardes had a friend who had a supply of Lionel paper that was for sale. Among that stack was a Lionel Catalog, printed entirely in Spanish. I already had one printed in Portuguese that had been obtained for me by a friend who found it in Brazil. One of the sights Jorges took me to see was a furniture store. How could I get excited about a furniture store, you may wonder? Well, that is what it was in late January of 2000. However, back in January, 1948, the building at 1145 San Martin was owned by Ezio Guggiari, Soc. De Resp. Ltd., which was the approved Lionel Service Station. IT is that address which is marked on the catalog and other Lionel paper I purchased that evening. Regrettably, the building was too large and it was too dark to get a decent photo of it the night I was there. Perhaps the next time. Buenos Aires is a big city and one of the major Opera houses of the world, Teatro Colon is there, and I haven't seen an opera in it, so a photo is still possible.

Lionel was marketed all around the world in 1948. There were Service Centers on 6 continents, only Antarctica being excepted. For a kids' toy, that was quite a world-wide market. Lionel with MPC continued using as Approved Service Stations those whose names appeared on the late 1960's lists, and did little to enforce the standards of what was supposed to be a quality Lionel Repair. The repairmen of years gone by passed out small cards which reminded the owners of Lionel Trains to " Bring your Lionel Trains in for a Check-Up by Approved Servicemen." It went on to say, "Your Lionel Train set is a valuable piece of property, deserving of proper care. When the late Jim Fenley took over, he asked the late Lenny Dean to try to get a handle on what was taking place. That's when my friend in New Jersey, Rich Bimmer, obtained his status as an Approved Lionel Service Station. After General Mills' stewardship of Lionel came Richard Kughn. Many Lionel Service Stations became FORMER Lionel Service Stations. By their own admission, they were Service Stations only so that they could get the yearly Lionel Holiday Service Station "Specials" so they could sell hard-to-obtain cars at exorbitant prices to collectors or build their own private collections rather inexpensively. It now seems that the current crop of owners, Wellspring Associates, have a handle on what is going on. The Service Station Specials have been eliminated and for the most part most, Approved Lionel Service Centers can and do fix broken trains. However, it is generally a good idea to find a person whom you trust to do any work on your toy trains, especially since most new trains work with hi-tech electronics and not with E-Units and the items which made the Lionel of the '50's move so well.

One final thing has also disappeared; at least I could not find any in Europe last summer. The Lionel Service Station on foreign soil has disappeared, as had I fear, Lionel's world-wide marketing of their product. Today it's more of a "Big Boy's Toy" rather than a kid's toy designed to build a strong bond between father and son. Somehow I get the idea that those I-Boxes aren't building too many close bonds between Dad and son.
